




## Welcome

The band travelled up to the Cairn Hotel in Harrogate on Friday 1st November for our annual intensive rehearsal weekend.


All of the music was new to us, or hadn't been played for many years and our MD Frankie put the band through it's paces with about 9 hours of rehearsal over the weekend.

The evening was hosted by GenX Radio Suffolk presenter Neil Whiteside and featured performances from both groups in the first half with the band performing music including the Dambusters March, Over the Rainbow, Benedictus and a Vera Lynn Medley while the choir performed songs including Pack up your troubles and Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy.

The second half featured a deeply moving drumhead service. To the sound of the Choir singing John Lennons "Imagine", band members Sam Salmon, Tim King, Harry Copsey and Sarah Parkinson carried the bands ceremonial drums in and assembled the drumhead before band Chairman Gordon Connah laid a wreath and 2470 Squadron Air Training Corps laid their squadron standard and the union flag.

Over £1400 was raised for the Royal British Legion and band funds!












Friday 8th November also saw a small group from the band perform for Barbara Abbotts final journey.
